



Accomplished in watercolours and oils

Periods

Illustrator – trained in lithography – the only formal training he ever had

Civil War Illustrator for a northern paper

Genre paintings of common day themes

First period in Europe – mainly as an art tourist

Adirondacks wilderness paintings

Second period in Europe (Britain)

Tropical scenes

Sea studies. Maine where he lived

Never an illustrator / depicter of grand events. Long had a sympathy for black people / working people





Never married

Was reclusive / eccentric in old age but never stopped working and produced some of his finest work in old age.
